### Where?

The Training Course will take place in Setúbal, Portugal.

Participants will be hosted in shared rooms of 3 to 8 persons. We will have a working space approximately 3 minutes away from the accommodation.

#### When?

Participants should arrive on the 21/11/2022 before 18h00, and leave on 29/11/2022 after 9h00... if possible.

Participants who chose to arrive a few days earlier or leave a few days later are welcome to do so, as long as the extra duration does not exceed 3 days in total and cover their own expenses for these extra days.

### What?

Working with groups that are always more diverse, how do we create graphic tools that are representative of the reality of our target groups? How do we create efficient visual communication, understandable by all, without falling into common stereotypes? How do we create visual tools that are universal yet stimulating and challenging of usual, often problematic simplistic representations? For instance, how do we efficiently portray "neutral" human figures without applying sexist, gendernormative, racist, ableist, ageist (and so on) reflexes? It is a common practice, when aiming to represent an average person or participant, to portray an able, thin, white, genderconforming man. Many of our target groups do not match this norm. However, if we step too far away from this norm, the message might get lost.

So how do we make our communication inclusive yet not confusing? How can we use the way we represent information graphically as a tool to raise awareness about diversity, as a daily practice? And where is the limit of cultural appropriation in these representations?

### **OBJECTIVES**

The objectives of our project are to join creative forces from several contexts and experiences, in order to learn together and from each other how to be more inclusive in the way we apply graphic facilitation in non-formal education contexts.

We hope to bring together youth workers and intercultural workers with different profiles and identities, in order to enrich our practices related to visual representations in our professional contexts.

### Who?

Each partner organisation will send 4 participants and 1 facilitator. All should be aged 18 or more.

The training course is designed particularly for youth workers, and more generally for people working with youth or other types of educational / social work: social and culture workers, teachers, volunteers, students, etc.

Priority will be given to youth workers with fewer opportunities to travel and train.

English will be the main working language, though we will strive to highlight language diversity and will be mindful of those for who English is less comfortable.



### How?

The programme covers the costs for travel (see budgets below), accommodation and food, activities and insurance on location. Each participant is responsible for organising their travel, with the support of their local organisation.

Each participant is also responsible for making sure they have the necessary and valid identification documents, as well as checking any restrictions related to COVID and their individual medical situation. Each participant is responsible for getting tested before they travel and ensuring that they arrive with a negative COVID test. The closest airport is Lisbon. The closest train and bus station is Setúbal. Once we know when and where people will be arriving, we will organise pick-up from the airport and/or bus and train stations. Each participant is responsible for purchasing their travel tickets and we be reimbursed as promptly as possible during or after the mobility, on the condition that they provide their invoices and boarding passes, in coordination with their local organisation.

The programme covers three meals a day for all programme days. Please inform your local organisation of any dietary or medical restrictions that should be taken into account by the team.
